2. What are Customs at the Feast of Tabernacles?

Build a Sukkah	Reread Leviticus 23:42-43, Jonah 4:5, Matthew 17:4	
	From Leviticus 23:40	
	• Fruit of beautiful trees (p'ri etz hadar)—it is custom to use an etrog (citron), a fruit that looks like a giant, bumpy lemon	
	Why an etrog? "According to an ancient tradition, when God first told	
	Moses about the four species, Moses sent messengers to Calabria	
	(Italy) to fetch an etrog from there"—Chabad.org	
The Four Species	Branches of palm trees (kapot t'marim)—date palm	
	• Boughs of leafy trees (anaph etz avot)—myrtle bough	
	 Willows of the brook (arbeh nachal)—willow branch 	
	 All four species are referred to as the lulav and etrog. 	
	• It is interesting to note that the data palm, myrtle, and willow are native	
	to Israel, but the citron is not—A picture of Jew and Gentile, one in

	According to the Midrash, the four species represent four different kinds of people		
	Etrog	Good fragrance and taste	One with good deeds and wisdom (Torah knowledge)
	Myrtle	Good fragrance, but inedible	One with good deeds, but lacks wisdom
	Date Palm	Edible, but no smell	One with wisdom, but lacks good deeds
	Willow	Neither taste nor smell	One with neither good deeds nor wisdom
Simchat Torah	"The rejoicing of the Torah"—Occurs on the eighth day, known as Shemini		
	Atzeret		
Read the Megillah	It is customary to read the entire book of Ecclesiastes.		
Simchat Beit Hashoeyah	Read article from Chabad titled "Simchat Beit Hashoevah"

a. The Birth of Messiah

John 1:14	"Dwelt"—skenoo G4637, from the word skene G4633, which is the Gk. Equivalent of sukkah	
Luke 1:5-38; 2:8-12; 2:21	Read notes from "When was the LORD born?"	

b. The Establishment of the Kingdom of Messiah

Exodus 12:37	The first place the children of Israel stopped was a placed called Sukkot.	
	• During the time of Sukkot, the traditional prayer Hoshana is recited	
	every day. It seems that the people were calling for Messiah to come,	
Matthew 21:6-10	but it wasn't the right time. Psalm 118:25-26	
	• Save now—hoshiah (H3467) na (H4994); hiphil imperative, so it could	
	say "Save, please"	
John 7:37-39	Yeshua claimed to be the Messiah on the seventh day of Tabernacles, or	
	Hoshana Raba	
Revelation 7:15 & 21:3	The Lord will dwell, or "tabernacle", with us for eternity.	
2 Chronicles 5:3	Read v.2-3; This is a picture of the establishment of the Kingdom.	
Zechariah 14:16-19	Tabernacles will be kept by all nations in the Kingdom; "punishment"—sin

4. Why the Emphasis on "Joy"?

Season of Our Rejoicing	Z'man Simchateinu	
Galatians 5:22	Joy (<i>chara</i> G5479) is one of the fruits of the Spirit.	
Psalm 51:8	Repentance brings joy (simchah H8057).	
Isaiah 35:10	In the Kingdom, there will be everlasting (olam H5769) joy.	
Isaiah 51:3, 11	Zion is characterized by joy and gladness (simchah).	
Luke 2:10	The joy (<i>chara</i>) of Messiah's birth is for all people.	
Numbers 10:10	The moedim are associated with joy (simchah).	
Nehemiah 8:1-18	Sukkot is a time of joy, not mourning, because it reminds us of the comin Kingdom.
